

There's more than history on the menu in **Steveston Village**, Richmond's charming 'old town' waterfront area. Still, a visit here should always include a trip to the past—especially at two of British Columbia's most evocative heritage attractions.

Start at the fascinating 1894-built **Gulf of Georgia Cannery National Historic Site 1**, one of BC's biggest salmon-canning operations until its 1979 closure. Much of the machinery is still in situ, giving the impression the workers have just stepped away for a tea break. Take a guided tour for the full story (1 hour).

Next, stroll the scenic shoreline boardwalk (20 minutes) to Britannia Shipyards National Historic Site 2. Here you'll discover some of the gritty stories behind this century-old shipyard complex. Immerse yourself in this captivating boat-building past, but save time to spot the waterfront birdlife, herons included (1 hour).

Back in the village, walk around **Fisherman's**Wharf (3) (30 minutes), where boats regularly roll in to sell their fresh catch. And if you're hungry, descend the ramp to **Pajo's** (7) floating open-air eatery, one of Richmond's most popular fish and chip spots. Deep-fried salmon, vinegar-drenched chips and house-made tartar sauce are recommended.

Walk off lunch with a leisurely stroll along Moncton Street 4, Steveston's main drag. It is lined on both sides with wood-sided little boutiques and inviting coffee houses. If you're shopping for someone with a sweet tooth back home, don't miss the cornucopia of tempting treats at the Candy Dish (8).

Give yourself plenty of time to search the side streets—there are bookstores and artisan shops to discover. Here on a Sunday? Don't miss the farmers' market (select Sundays at the Gulf of Georgia Cannery National Historic Site 1) from October to April or across from the Steveston Community Centre 5 from May to September).

The time of year is also key if you want to catch a glimpse of BC's amazing marine life. Whale-watching season runs from April to October here with ever-popular boat tours (3-5 hours) operated from Fisherman's Wharf 3 by Steveston Seabreeze Adventures 11 and Vancouver Whale Watch 12. It's a spine-tingling chance to spot orcas and more in their natural habitats.

If you're back onshore in time—or you're simply looking for an alternative to the whale-watching option—exercise your land legs with a bicycle rental from Village Bike Rentals (3) (1-2 hours). Recommended route? Nearby Garry Point Park (3) is a lovely greenspace with breathtaking views—perfect for waterfront sunsets. Also popular with kiteflyers, you might even spot a bald eagle or two overhead.

By now, you've likely built up quite an appetite.
Drop into Moncton Street's ever-friendly

Tourism Richmond Visitor Centre to ask
for dinner recommendations. Steveston
has a full menu of great places to eat, and
fresh-caught local seafood is the way to go—
consider Blue Canoe Waterfront Restaurant
of or Catch Kitchen + Bar (1-2 hours).
Wherever you choose to dine, it will be the
perfect finale to your Steveston grand tour.
